<p>Make Moon Dough!</p> <p>You will need ½ cup hair conditioner 1 cup of cornstarch Food coloring (optional) Glitter/ beads / etc. (optional)</p> <p>Mix together hair conditioner and cornstarch until you have a consistency that you like. Add food coloring or glitter (mix). Add more cornstarch if it is too sticky. Add extra conditioner if it is dry.</p>	<p>Write 5 fractions making sure your numerator is smaller than your denominator (numerator=top number, denominator=bottom number), THEN draw a picture to represent your fractions.</p>	<p>Practice your spelling words sent by your classroom teacher in 3 different ways (examples: rainbow, stairs/stacks, rhyming words, or any other way that you want to practice). Have someone test you on them at the end of the week. :)</p>	<p>A Jump Rope Jingle is a song or rhyme you say or sing as you jump rope. How many Jump Rope Jingles do you know? Adjective Definition

- Adjectives that compare (comparatives and superlatives).
- A comparative is an adjective that adds -er or more to compare 2 things.... Amy is **taller** than Julie. Today is **more beautiful** than yesterday.
- A superlative adds -est or most to compare 3 or more things... George is the **tallest** boy in the class. Today is the **most beautiful** day.

A Real Life Batman



Daniel Kish is blind, yet he can hike, play basketball, and even ride a bicycle! Just like a bat, Kish uses echolocation to move without bumping into things. As he moves, Kish makes a clicking noise with his tongue. The noise bounces off the objects around him and he uses his ears to "see" them in his mind.

Echolocation is not just like having sight. He can't see colors or see objects that are smaller than a softball. "It's like seeing with dim flashes of light," Kish says.

Kish believes that any blind person can learn to echolocate. He started an organization called *World Access for the Blind* to teach children to echolocate. "It isn't that difficult to teach. It really isn't," Kish says. "I believe that the brain is already partly wired to do this." Kish thinks every blind person should have the chance to learn echolocation. He says that not allowing it would be, "very shortsighted."
